Department News:

Police Department

- The Truro Police Department would like to share some safety tips for driving during the winter months.
 - Snow and ice conditions make up approximately one quarter of vehicle crashes. This is due to factors such as poor visibility and difficulty in slowing or stopping.
 - It is important to stock your vehicle with an ice scraper and a shovel in case of an emergency. If your vehicle has snow or ice on it, be sure to remove it from windows, mirrors, lights and reflectors before driving.
 - Snow banks can hinder visibility at intersections and winding roads.
 - Speed limits are established for roadways that are dry. Weather conditions may create the need for reduced speed.
 - Windshield wipers are much more effective when they are not worn. Additionally, windshield washer fluid can help minimize ice and glare.
 - Avoid unnecessary distractions while you are driving, such as cell phones. This is especially important when weather conditions are poor.
 - o If you are traveling to an area that is remote or has limited phone coverage, let someone know. If you get stuck along the way, this information will be very important for first responders.

Town of Truro Town Manager's Weekly Report

February 1, 2019

Department of Public Works

- DPW crews will continue seasonal roadway brush cutting through the winter months to accommodate emergency vehicles. Woodchips from roadside clearing are available at the Transfer Station for any permitted resident for personal use only. All roadsides will be evaluated throughout the entire winter season targeting trees that are a hazard to town infrastructure and power lines.
- Due to the government shut down, the East Harbor seaward end construction project has been delayed.
- New split rail and snow fencing has been installed at Head of the Meadow beach and Beach Point Landing to assist with beach erosion.
- As part of DEP post closure requirements, the final as-built document has been submitted to DEP to reflect the location of the landfill cap liner. In addition, a new Waste Ban Compliance Plan has also been submitted along with a third-party inspection report of the Transfer Station and Landfill area.

Harbormaster/Shellfish Constable

- Shellfish Constable Jackett met with the Shellfish Committee to review a Shellfish Aquaculture Application.
- Shellfish Constable Jackett worked on a letter to the Division of Marine Fisheries explaining the success of the shellfish relay program.

- o Beach fire permits for September 5, 2018 or later are issued at the Truro Fire Department.
- Warning Recent shark sightings, practice shark safety.
 - Don't swim where seals are present.
 - Don't swim too far from shore.
 - Swim in groups.
 - Avoid wearing shiny jewelry or other accessories (which look like fish scales to a shark).
 - Avoid surfing alone.
 - Avoid areas with signs of baitfish or fish feeding activity watch for diving seabirds.
 - Be aware that sharks may be present between sandbars or near steep drop offs.

Health/Conservation

- The core team for the Town of Truro has set a meeting date for the Town's Municipal Vulnerability
 Preparedness (MVP) planning process, a Truro-Wellfleet community resilience building facilitated
 process. Please watch or attend the February 12 Select Board meeting for a discussion of the MVP
 process and request for Stakeholder participation. Stakeholders should include a representative from
 the Select Board and each regulatory Board, as well as interested community members.
- Recent storm events resulted in significant damage to a number of bulkheads on beach point. Other
 locations realized significant erosion of the bayside face of the Coastal Dune. In some cases, they had no
 margin of acceptable loss and foundations have been compromised. A couple of these locations have
 previously planned and permitted repair work/replacement projects that can immediately begin to
 address the damage. Others have been issued emergency certifications to let property owners promptly
 address conditions that may endanger health and safety or cause further damage to structures. These
 properties will need to develop long-range plans to replace failing structures and present them to the
 Conservation Commission for permitting. Typical Conservation Commission permits (called orders of
 conditions) are valid for 3 years.
