Announcements:

Several Executive Orders were issued by the Governor this week, and each is discussed in the Health and Conservation section. Importantly, effective Friday Nov 6, all residents of Massachusetts are advised to stay home during the hours of 10pm and 5 am. Travel during this time may include going to work or school or for essential needs such as seeking emergency medical care, etc. Moreover, face coverings are required in all <u>public places</u>, whether indoors or outdoors (medical exemptions apply) for all persons over the age of 5 and recommended for ages 2-5.

This week's activities of note from the Town Manager's Office

- Election day was Tuesday, November 3. There were 1767 votes cast in Truro, which represent 87% of our registered voters. There were 1178 early voters, 47 absentee ballots, and 542 in-person voters.

Department News:

DPW

- The Transfer Station will be closed every Wednesday and Thursday from November 1, 2020 through April 30, 2021.
- The opening of the Swap Shop will be evaluated at COVID 19 Reopening Phase 4.
- As the fall approaches, the DPW will begin to inventory and service all snow removal assets and review Department call-in procedures.
- The annual third-party inspection has been completed for the Transfer Station and Landfill. No local Board of Health or DEP regulatory or operational discrepancies were noted.
- Due to exceptional recycling efforts at the Transfer Station, the DPW has received an \$8,400 dollar grant from DEP for recycling infrastructure.
- Fall brush cutting of all Town roads will begin next week, along with catch basin inventory and cleaning.

- As part of disaster preparedness, we will continue to take a more aggressive approach to brush cutting roadsides.
- As we head into the winter season all culverts and waterways will be evaluated for any obstructions and sediment buildup. As done last year, we will clean and jet culverts as needed.
- Resurfacing of the apparatus bay at the Safety Facility will continue for the next two weeks.

Harbor Master/Shellfish Constable

- Harbor Master Jackett has been hauling basin floats and storing them in the parking lot.
- Harbor Master Jackett cleaned tidal mooring floats and stored them for the season.
- Shellfish Constable repaired shellfish gear and spliced rope for mooring balls.
- Shellfish areas in Pamet remain closed until the State says we can open. We should be testing next week.

Health and Conservation

- Increasing case counts of Massachusetts residents diagnosed with COVID-19 prompted Governor Baker to release several new (revised) Orders, and for the Department of Public Health to issue a Stay at Home advisory to all residents, effective November 6, 2020.
 - Order #55 -revised order requiring <u>facial coverings in public places</u> applies to everyone in public spaces indoors or out of doors (medical exemptions apply). This is extended to carpooling with non-household members. Employers may now require documentation from employees claiming they have a medical exemption, and schools may now require documentation from students claiming the exemption.
 - Revised Order #54 further regulating <u>Gatherings</u> in the Commonwealth now hinges with the DPH Stay at Home advisory and requires outdoor and indoor events and gatherings to disperse by 9:30 PM. Face coverings are required at all public gatherings. Gatherings of non-related individuals at private homes and gatherings at event venues have limited capacities, and all must adhere to the standards of masking and physical distancing; Enforcement and fining is clarified.
 - Order #53- requiring early closure for certain businesses and activities, limiting hours for alcohol and adult use cannabis sales and modifying Chapter 138 license renewal requirements (the early closure and alcohol order)- this order specifies a mandatory night-time closing period-9:30pm-5:00 am; businesses (other than retail) that are open to the public or admit customers or members must close during those hours. Restaurants may sell take-out without alcoholic beverages after that time, but no patrons may be seated or served. This order simplifies the alcohol license renewal requirements for establishments that are closed to the public whether seasonally, or due to COVID-19.
- Effective Friday Nov 6, all residents of Massachusetts are advised to stay home during the hours of 10pm and 5 am. Travel during this time may include going to work or school or for essential needs such as seeking emergency medical care, etc.; Gatherings in your home with anyone outside of the family is discouraged; using remote means of visiting and communicating is recommended.
- Our weekly calls with DPH/DLS and their partners have morphed into 2x weekly interagency webinars to
 present new data and requirements, interpretations, guidance documents etc. The Barnstable County
 Health Agent Coalition (HAC) continues to hold a weekly call to review the latest local issues and State
 Orders, as well as funding for COVID expenses.
- I am very pleased to be a part of a working group of Health Agents and County officials discussing testing strategies for Cape Cod. This has stemmed from the Cape not meeting the State criteria of being RED for a long enough time for a "stop the spread" clinic. But we all agree that we do have a need for proactive testing to test asymptomatic people, and address situations that may involve Town staff, first responders and essential workers. Our need is strongly anchored in the demographic of our very high number of "at risk" seniors, and in the transient nature of our tourist-based economy. We are making

- the argument to the State, but at the same time are searching for local, regional solutions. I will continue to report on our progress.
- The annual seasonal influenza vaccination clinic was held on 10/29. This clinic was slated to be a drivethru but the rains of last week scuttled that plan, and we implemented a modified, traditional walkthrough clinic. The event was well-attended, and the participants easily adjusted to the rainy-day change in plans.
- All school-aged children in Massachusetts are required to be vaccinated for Seasonal Influenza before the end of 2020. We have scheduled 2 clinics for families and teachers. They will be held on December 4 in Wellfleet from 2:30-4:30 in the elementary school gymnasium, and in Truro on December 11 from 3:30-5:30 at the Community Center. Participants from each school can attend either clinic.
- Last week we kicked off the Pilgrim Pond watershed study with the Cape Cod Commission. Part of this work will be done using funds from the current health department budget for water sampling. We are also developing a budget to implement the pond and well water sampling for FY22.

Recreation and Beach

- We would like to remind the public to continue to practice social distancing while visiting parks, trails, playgrounds and beaches and wear a face covering when in public. For more information concerning COVID-19 click HERE

- The department is researching bringing back indoor recreational activities.
- **The Truro Community Center** is closed, but staff are still in the office. Staff can still be reached by phone (508)487-1632, email <u>dclements@truro-ma.gov</u>, or via Facebook, and Twitter.
- The Truro Beach Office (36 Shore Rd) is closed and beaches are no longer protected by lifeguards.
 Currently beach stickers are not required to visit Town of Truro beaches or park in Town of Truro beach parking lots. ORV stickers are still required to access the bayside, off-road corridor. To order online click HERE. For inquiries about the beaches, please call (508)487-6983. Truro beach fire permits are currently suspended.
- **Puma Park Playground** is open. We remind the public to practice social distancing and wear a face mask in public. The playground is cleaned weekly and hand sanitizing stations are present. Portable restrooms are no longer available.
- Shark Warning Great White Sharks are still active through October. Practice shark safety.
 - Don't swim where seals are present.
 - Don't swim too far from shore.
 - Swim in groups.
 - Avoid wearing shiny jewelry or other accessories (which look like fish scales to a shark).
 - Avoid surfing alone.
 - Avoid areas with signs of baitfish or fish feeding activity watch for diving seabirds.
 - Be aware that sharks may be present between sandbars or near steep drop offs.
- All programming/activities are suspended to stop the spread of the Coronavirus


